He has over a decade's experience in higher education and instructional technology. Steve received his undergraduate and graduate degrees in English from The University of North Carolina. As the director of the WELL, Steven develops educational programs and oversees program and building operations.

Wednesday Forums Continue to Draw Students

This year, the WELL's Forums are held on Wednesdays at 3:15, right after school ends. We present community members who are role models for young people who explain how they reached their professional goals and what students can do while in school to improve their chances of success in the real world. Speakers share with students information that will tie classroom learning to real world experiences; sometimes our speakers talk specifically about careers, sometimes about topical issues that interest teens. We are fortunate to have many community and business leaders who contribute their time, knowledge, and expertise. Free pizza is provided to participants at the end of each forum.

Enhanced Academic Focus to Begin in January

Beginning January 4, 2011, the WELL will implement some changes regarding student participation in the academic and extracurricular services of the Learning Lab. To create a more "productive, academic environment," students will be asked to create a personalized agenda and actively participate in a program while at the facility.

As part of its academic focus, the WELL offers short-term and intensive tutoring to students as well as homework management guidance. Volunteers from NC Teaching fellows and Broughton Honor Society are available in a variety of subjects. Tutoring activities are currently coordinated by Winifred Cherry, Ph.D. Her 30-year background in education includes teaching English and Latin at Broughton High School. NovaNet software continues to be available at the WELL for use by students and teachers. NovaNet is a comprehensive credit recovery system with interactive online lessons that act as a personal tutor for each student at all different levels. Short Fiction Awards

Dr. Steven Killion presented the Short Fiction Awards on October 23th at an awards event at the NC English Teachers Association conference at Wake Forest University. Scholarships and a gift to the first place winner's English Department brought the total amount of recipient prizes to \$10,000. First place (\$5,000) winner Sarah Stidham, a student at Broughton High School in Raleigh, submitted Be Somebody. Sarah's teacher is Babs Nichols, and her parents are Anna and Fil Stidham. Her school's English Department will also receive \$2,000. Austin Halbert, who attends Cleveland County's Crest High School, won second place (\$2,000) with Locked Up. His parents are Buddy and Heather Halbert, and his teacher is David Putnam. The Visitor brought a third place (\$1,000) win to Sarah Peters, who is a student of Broughton's Sharon Winzeler and the daughter of Glen and Lynne Peters.

Entries are now being accepted for the 2011 Wade Edwards Short Fiction Award. The award is given annually to three North Carolina high school juniors who submit the most outstanding original short fiction. The competition, administered and supported by the North Carolina English Teachers Association and the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction and sponsored by the Wade Edwards Foundation, rewards excellence in creative writing and encourages the contemplation of virtues associated with Wade Edwards: humility, strength of convictions, loyalty, honor, charity, determination, the value of family, and the obligations of friendship and community.
