Volunteer Profile: Man on a Mission by Katherine Messenger

Joe Mabiala speaks quietly to one of his students, and in an instant she is laughing and nodding her head. He moves on to the next student, praising him for the unique way he found to display his spreadsheet information, shares a joke, then moves on down the row. The computer lab at the Wade Edwards Learning Lab (WELL) is full of hardworking men and women, all eager to learn MS Office software from a master of the trade. They are enrolled in a series of computer training classes, provided through the International Free Computer Training and Charitable Center (IFCTCC), led by Joe Mabiala, initially supported by Edenton Street United Methodist Church and now by the Wade Edwards Foundation. The Foundation provides computers and space in the WELL as in-kind support, and Joe offers his services gratis to any one who is interested. The classes are filled each session with a variety of people, including some who are interested in furthering their careers and others who want to keep their skills sharp. The WELL is a great facility for Joe's efforts - centrally located with the latest technology and equipment. The ten-week classes are held in the evenings, perfect for those working during the day and/or those that can trade off with another family member for childcare.

A native of Central Africa, Joe is fluent in four languages. Having lived in the United States for fifteen years, his English is flavored with hints of French and Swahili along with a Southern twang. With his laid-back demeanor and vast knowledge of computers and software, Joe makes the material easy to understand and very applicable to real-life business situations. Joe's teaching style is relaxed, and he offers praise, advice and gentle reminders while delivering the information in a deliberate, concise format.

One of his fifteen students this session, Valecia Scott, is hard at work on an Excel spreadsheet. She discovered Joe's class through a flyer at the public library. She wants to start a home business, and this class will help her reach her goals. "I've learned a lot in this class in a relatively short period of time," Valecia explains. "Joe is a great teacher, and I will definitely sign up for the next level."

Joe has come a long way since his early days in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The fifth of seven children, a group of Methodist Missionaries selected him for mentoring at a young age. They sponsored him to attend elementary and secondary school and even college. Just weeks from completing his degree, however, civil war broke out in his country. The missionaries and the United States Consulate gave him safe passage to the United States. He was able to transfer most of his credit hours to the Methodist College in Fayetteville, where he completed his degree in criminal justice and pre-law. Joe hopes to attend law school in the near future.

After arriving in Raleigh, Joe sought employment through Manpower and was placed at Nortel where he learned a variety of skills. He was particularly adept with computers. His strong work ethic and personal philosophy helped him grow from a part-time forklift driver to a full-time customer service analyst. Joe settled in Raleigh, where is also busy with his three young daughters – a ten year old and twin nine-year-olds.

Joe's interest in offering free computer training stems from his wish to give back to his community. He is grateful for the opportunities provided him, and it is his wish to help others as a way to "repay" the people that provided for his education and journey to America. (continued)

"God gives you blessings and you do not know why," he says. "You should use these blessings to empower someone else." He credits God with his good fortunes and with leading the way to help others. "God even showed me how to give back," he explains. "I had a dream in which I saw a big building filled with computers and knew that teaching others what I have learned was the next course for my life." Through his computer courses, he reaches out to people who are less fortunate – "for example, those who, like me, are from another country but may not have the resources that I had or can't afford the education right now. I can help them learn skills that will qualify them to get a better job and be productive citizens."

Joe distributes flyers about the courses on cars in parking lots, at the library, and through the PTA of Wake County Schools. The students in attendance tonight are here to learn the basics. Joe has divided the class into two groups - beginner and advanced - and gives an assignment to all based on real information the class has provided – address book information, class rosters, client lists, etc. He answers questions as the students delve into the work. There are no lectures or made-up examples. Joe provides real, hands-on experience, tailored to each person's needs. He is quiet yet bursting with happiness and gratitude, eager to teach and reach out to others. He regales his students with tales of Africa and intersperses his lessons with hilarious jokes and colloquialisms. Throughout the evening, there is much laughter, the quiet clack-clacking of computer keys and exclamations of, "Oh! Now I get it!" Joe offers lessons on all the packages under the Microsoft Office umbrella, as well as web design and other skills the students request.

After God, family and work, Joe's passion is singing. In fact, his musical interest at Edenton Street Methodist Church led him to the WELL. One of his first friends at the church and his choir buddy, Ellan Maynard, is on the foundation's board of trustees. When Joe had the idea for the computer class, he talked it over with Ellan. They presented the idea to the Mission Committee, whose members gave him the green light and a place to offer his first classes. Later, Ellan introduced Joe to Sarah Lowder, and they in turn struck up a friendship and a business agreement. Joe moved his classes to the WELL and was able to increase his class sizes and broaden the scope of his lessons.

Sarah Lowder, director of the Wade Edwards Foundation, notes that Joe has recruited numerous other volunteers over the years, in particular Jim Russell, to help teach the IFCTCC classes. She remarked that Joe and Jim are two of the most dedicated and resourceful volunteers she has met in any setting during her career.

On this particular night, Joe and his students worked a little on lessons, then had a group discussion about translators, green cards, ESL classes, and where to get the best sandwiches in Raleigh. It was a lively, informative conversation, led by Joe, who engaged everyone with his quick wit and contagious smile. Then the group got back to business, working on spreadsheets into the night. The classes seem to offer many things to many people – computer basics, real world information that can be indispensable to some of the attendees, and fun stuff, delivered "Joe" style.

"I'm thankful," Joe says with an easy smile. "Through God's grace, I am here in the U.S. meeting good people, experiencing things I never knew possible. I am truly blessed."

Joe hopes to help many people through his classes, and computer skills are only a part of how he helps others. He takes the time to care about his students and makes a difference in each person's life. The WELL and its staff and volunteers are fortunate to be a part of Joe's dream.



Students Teaching Students: Incoming 9th Graders, Please Mark Your Calendars

The principal project of The Wade Edwards Foundation, the Wade Edwards Learning Lab (WELL) is an after-school computer lab and academic support facility located across from Broughton High School. Each summer, student staff members teach Jumpstart technology classes to Broughton rising ninth graders. This past summer, student instructors included Spencer Weeks-Jamieson, Nikolai Lifanov, Tom Gill, Brianne Gill, Rachel Wright, Adam Clark, and Jessi Rogers. WELL Director Steven Killion oversees the workshops and develops the curriculum in collaboration with Broughton faculty members.

The workshops introduce new students to resources available at the WELL and to some of the technology tools they will need to succeed at Broughton, where teachers increasingly use the Internet and computer applications in their assignments. Students collaborate to develop a multimedia project that will introduce them to Broughton High School's curriculum. Each workshop takes place three hours a day for two days, for a total of six hours per student. This is a great opportunity to meet and work closely with a group of fellow ninth-graders and the very cool WELL staff!

2009 Wade Edwards Foundation 10th Annual Short Fiction Awards

Dr. Steven Killion presented the Short Fiction Awards on October 17th at an awards dinner at the NC English Teachers Association conference in Lenoir, NC. Scholarships and a gift to the first place winner's English Department brought the total amount of recipient prizes to \$10,000.

First place (\$5,000) winner **Jonathan Blake Willis**, a student at Burke Middle College in Morganton, submitted *The Awakening*. Jonathan's teacher is Anna Moose; his mother is Tonia Denise Elliott. His school's English Department will also receive \$2,000. Amanda Carringer, who attends Watauga High School in Boone, won second place (\$2,000) with *Patchwork*. Her parents are Don and Laura Carringer; her teacher is William B. Watterson. *The Mourning Dove* brought a third place (\$1,000) win to Emma Seagle, who is also a Watauga High School student in Boone and the daughter of Steve and Laura Seagle.

Entries are now being accepted for the **2010 Wade Edwards Short Fiction Award**. The award is given annually to three North Carolina high school juniors who submit the most outstanding original short fiction. The competition, administered and supported by the North Carolina English Teachers Association and the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction and sponsored by the Wade Edwards Foundation, rewards excellence in creative writing and encourages the contemplation of virtues associated with Wade Edwards: humility, strength of convictions, loyalty, honor, charity, determination, the value of family, and the obligations of friendship and community. Wade was a talented high school student whose life ended tragically at the age of 16.

The deadline for entries is **April 15, 2020.** Entry length may vary from 500-10,000 words of original short fiction. The entry must be typed and saved in electronic format.
